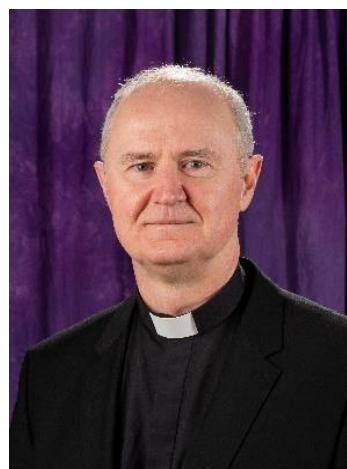

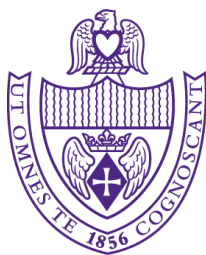

Vincentian Mission Day Session Descriptions

Martyrs, Mystics, and Missionaries: Vincentian History in the Stained Glass of Gacioch Chapel

Amelia Gallagher

Together with Art History students, Dr. Gallagher will guide participants through the stained glass works of Gacioch Chapel. There are three series of stained glass, depicting the following episodes of Vincentian history: 1. The life of St. Vincent de Paul (1581-1660); 2. The martyrdom of St. Francois Regis Clet (1820); 3. The mystical visions of Daughters of Charity, Catherine Labouree and Apolline Andriveau, which occurred in 1830 and 1846 respectively.

Open Up to Open In: Using Guided Journaling for Self-Discovery

To look deeper inside, we need to allow ourselves to be vulnerable. Journaling allows us to do that in a non-judgmental environment. Many people, however, struggle to come up with ideas or topics to ask such questions. This workshop will lead participants through a guided journaling practice using Suleika Jaouad's "The Book of Alchemy." Participants will gather, listen to an essay and prompt from the book, and then have time to explore what this passage means for them in their journals. Multidisciplinary Perspectives on Cultivating Transformative Teaching and Learning Experiences through Reflective Practice

Institutions of higher education experience profound shifts due to developments of advanced technologies and increased human diversity in education. This session is the result of four faculty members' collaboration as an outcome of participation in professional development workshops on inclusive pedagogies. Transforming teaching and learning in a college classroom requires instructors to expand old pedagogies by incorporating new, innovative, and research-based approaches to teaching and learning. Furthermore, it is essential for instructors to engage in self-reflection as an exercise in the process of self-transformation on their

pedagogical journey of preparing graduates. Cultivating transformative learning suggests recalibrating one's teaching. The professors teach in three different colleges, which adds a wealth of insights and approaches to facilitating inclusive pedagogy within their respective areas of expertise.

Special Olympics Coaching and Games Management: Collaborations in Vincentian Education

Since 2006, every Thursday of the spring semester, students with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD) from the Niagara Falls City School District participate as athletes in the Special Olympics Coaching and Games Management course during weekly basketball practices. Niagara University students who take the course train the athletes for competition in the western region basketball tournament, which the students plan and host as their final exam. This session will include facilitation of course activities at the Kiernan Recreation Center. Facilitators will discuss critical university-wide and community collaborations that have developed over time and potential for future developments, and partners from the Niagara Falls City School District will be invited to share their perspectives about participation in the program. Niagara University student coaches will also be invited to share their experiences and course outcomes as related to their professional goals.

Many of the barriers disabled people encounter every day are not always obvious to others. In addition to physical barriers, people with disabilities often take on extra emotional, cognitive, social, and logistical work just to navigate school, workplaces, healthcare settings, public spaces, and everyday interactions. This interactive session will explore the concept of hidden labor through discussion and real-life examples related to college life, community participation, and future careers. Participants will examine how inaccessible systems, communication barriers, social expectations, and everyday assumptions can impact belonging both on campus

and in professional environments. Students will also be encouraged to consider accessibility within their own fields of study and future professions, and to think about the role they can play in creating communities that are more accessible, respectful, and inclusive for everyone.
